## WHO ELSE CAN WE TELL



Most recently I have had the occasion of having to share unfavorable news to a host of people. As I was sharing the news, I paused on several occasions to ask myself the question, "Who else do I need to tell?" So I thought a

little while, then came up with a few more names, then a few more, and so on, until I had exhausted all those whom I thought it essential to inform. As I went through this process spreading unfavorable news, I did so with an urgency, so as to assure I hadn't left anyone out.

I am very sure that most of us go through this same process even when there is good news to share. The motivation is to get the information out as quickly and to as many who need to know as we possibly can. We are eager to make sure those who are closest to us in our family or social circles are not left out. In one sense, we feel obligated to let them know because of our close affinity to them and because we know that they would do the same thing for us. With the introduction of social media, our assignment sometimes becomes easier as we can reach more people with an instantaneous click of the mouse or swipe of a finger.

I have noticed that even little children, when they are in possession of some juicy news such as a new car in the family, a new sibling or sometimes even a fight between mommy and daddy, they cannot keep it to themselves and are eager to tell even a stranger in a store. There is something about having the news that others don't know that drives children and even adults to tell it until they can not find anyone else to tell. The interesting thing about a little child telling you their story is that they expect you to listen, even if you have no interest what so ever. They are not ashamed, nor are they afraid to pour out all the family business.

I know some of you grew up in very private homes where you were taught that whatever happens in this house, stays in this house and that you better not go telling the family business in the streets. Family business isn't everybody's business. I suppose the idea was to keep nosey people out of your family issues and to present an image that in your house all is well.

Why should we lie and pretend all is well when it is not? How come we cannot tell people outside our family that there is a void in our family? Why is it wrong to tell them we were adopted? What's so bad about telling them that our Father has a lot of children who have another mother. Can someone tell me why you don't want me to tell the story of our family, how our dad was murdered and that He didn't usually go to church but did His own thing and made a lot of people mad, mostly because He said He was better than everybody else. I know it sounds bad but our Dad was a good Father and cared about everybody. He paid off everybody's debt so that they could enjoy life.

I am sorry, but I am not ashamed of my family, nor am I going to be silenced about the fact that my dad was righteously rich. He owns everything and His love saved me. I have got to tell the story like a child in a store that my dad can save them too and has no problem adopting them into the family. Yes, He was murdered, but on the third day He was raised from the dead and now lives. To whomever will believe in Him. they too shall be saved, have their debt of sin paid for, and then experience abundant life. In fact, the truth is, I have already told a lot of people, but I am still thinking about "Who else can I tell?" For the rest of my brothers and sisters join me in telling our family business to everyone you can. Even if they don't seem to want to hear it, tell them anyway and when you have told as many as you can, ask yourself, "Who else can I tell?"

# IMMUNIZATION AWARENESS Claiming the Corridor for Christ



August is Immunization Awareness Month. The following article is taken from <u>healthychildren.org</u> and is submitted by the Health & Wellness Ministry for your consideration.

### **Vaccine Safety: The Facts**

Some people have expressed concerns about vaccine safety. The fact is vaccines save lives and protect against the spread of disease. If you decide not to immunize, you're not only putting your child at risk to catch a disease that is dangerous or deadly but also putting others in contact with your child at risk. Getting vaccinated is much better than getting the disease.

Indeed, some of the most devastating diseases that affect children have been greatly reduced or eradicated completely thanks to vaccination. Today, we protect children and teens from 16 diseases that can have a terrible effect on their young victims if left unvaccinated.



Your pediatrician knows that you care about your child's health and safety. That's why you need to get all the scientific facts from a medical professional you can trust before making any decisions based on stories you may have seen or heard on TV, the Internet, or from other parents.

## Your pediatrician cares about your child, too, and wants you to know that...

- Vaccines work. They have kept children healthy and have saved millions of lives for more than 50 years. Most childhood vaccines are 90% to 99% effective in preventing disease. And if a vaccinated child does get the disease, the symptoms are usually less serious than in a child who hasn't been vaccinated. There may be mild side effects, like swelling where the shot was given, but they do not last long. And it is rare for side effects to be serious.
- Vaccines are safe. Before a vaccine is licensed in the United States, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) reviews all aspects of development, including where and how the vaccine is made and the studies that have been conducted in people who received the vaccine. The FDA will not license a vaccine unless it meets standards for effectiveness (how well the vaccine works) and safety. Results of studies get reviewed again by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Academy of Family Physicians before a licensed vaccine is officially recommended to be given to children. Every lot of vaccine is tested to ensure quality (including safety) before the vaccine reaches the public. In addition, FDA regularly inspects places where vaccines are made.
- Vaccines are necessary. Your pediatrician believes that your children should receive all recommended childhood vaccines. In the United States vaccines have protected children and continue to protect children from many diseases. However, in many parts of the world many vaccine-preventable diseases that are rarely seen in the United States are still common. Since some vaccine-preventable diseases still occur in the United States and others may be brought into the United States by Americans who travel abroad or from people visiting areas with current disease outbreaks, it's important that your children are vaccinated.

• Vaccines are studied. To monitor the safety of vaccines after licensure, the FDA and the CDC created the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS). All doctors must report certain side effects of vaccines to VAERS. Parents can also file reports with VAERS. For more information about VAERS, visit <a href="https://www.vaers.hhs.gov">www.vaers.hhs.gov</a> or call the toll-free VAERS information line at 800/822-7967. Other systems exist to further study vaccine safety concerns if they are identified in VAERS by FDA and CDC.

#### **Protection for Everyone**

Just as important as the initial vaccinations are the booster shots. These are designed to continue immunity by building on the previous vaccines' effectiveness. Unfortunately, some parents forget or skip the boosters, which undercut the effectiveness of a very important concept in vaccination: *herd immunity*. Herd immunity is the benefit everyone receives from a vaccinated population once immunization reaches a critical level. When enough people are vaccinated, everyone—including those who are too young or too sick to be immunized—receives some protection from the spread of diseases. However, relying on herd immunity to keep your child safe is risky. The more parents that follow this way of thinking, the fewer vaccinated children we will have, and the more likely a serious disease will return and infect all of those unvaccinated.

In the rare case that a child has serious side effects to a vaccine, parents can contact the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP) at 800/338-2382 or <a href="www.hrsa.gov/vaccinecompensation">www.hrsa.gov/vaccinecompensation</a>. This federal program was created to help pay for the care of people who have been harmed.

If you have any additional questions or concerns, feel free to ask your pediatrician.


