In the gospel of Matthew, chapter nineteen, many little children were brought to Jesus that He might lay His hands on them and pray for them; however, His disciples assuming it was a bother to Jesus

or that He did not have the time to be praying for the children, rebuked them for doing so. Jesus surprises them and says, "Let the little children come to Me, and do not forbid them; for of such is the kingdom of heaven." He took the time with them to touch them and pray for them. He was not too busy nor irritated by the opportunity to do so. What a beautiful picture of the love of God towards His children. It says to me that children are not a bother to God, but rather of great significance in that they are of the fiber of the make-up of the kingdom of heaven.

Most recently, my heart has been wrenched to see the children of this world be brushed off and rebuked by a disintegrating, grinding system of politics, injustice, social confusion, economic depravity, moral degeneracy, and spiritual impoverishment. Are we too busy to attend to their needs? Are we so lofty that they are an interruption to our plans? Are they not worth us taking a moment to touch them and pray for them? I wonder if we have forgotten that we too were once helpless children in need of the grace of adults to guide and protect us. Now It seems that we have grown older and laid target on the innocent children, by abandoning them in their time of need and instead of protecting them, we are leaving them to the wolves of society to devour them.

As I watched and listened to the cries and pleas of small children separated from their parents and like dogs, locked behind cages and given thermal blankets to keep warm while a news host suggested it was like summer camp, I wondered what have we, as human beings, have become. As I watched children shot down in the streets like rabid animals by police, who have no compassion or acceptance of their responsibility, I wondered to myself, what is happening here on earth? When I keep hearing of abusive scenarios of children, some in families, some by family members, some being sold like shoes on craigslist, I had to ask God, "What is it going to take for us to wake up and or rebel against the status quo?"

Should we all just go to Zara and get a jacket that expresses our lack of feelings or should we, like the disciples, rebuke them? I must confess I have found it extremely difficult to see the children being ignored and abused by adults who should know better. In my deepest moment of feeling hopeless, I heard the Father saying, "I care. Suffer the little children to come to me and forbid them not." He is not too busy. He has His hands on them and is praying for them. If my heart and your heart grieves, imagine how He feels. I want to plead with all the adults and responsible teens not to rebuke the children, but rather take the time to protect them, to speak for those who have no voice, to pray for those who need God's favor, and to understand the value of children to the Kingdom of God.

Seventy-three ladies sang during the 8:00 am service and 77 gave their voices for the 11:00 am service.

Some of the songs sung by the Choir were "We Adore You", "We Praise Your Name", "Pressed Down, Shaken Together & Running Over" and "Release." However, the song the ladies "showed up and showed out" was their very powerful rendition of "Omnipotent He's Great our Lord!" I'm sure all in attendance can say with me they let the Lord use them in a mighty way on that song!

The Choir was able to sing so magnificently due to the direction of the Guest Director, Sis. Robin Winfield. Sis. Winfield is the Associate Pastor of Music & Evangelism at Revival Temple Full Gospel Church located at 2431 Shannon Place, SE in Washington, DC. During the 8:00 am service, Pastor Sterling complimented Sister Winfield on her gift of directing the choir by saying "directing a choir is a fading craft." Not only was Sis. Winfield talented, I was told our KBC Women's Choir members enjoyed working with her as there was a sister connection during rehearsals with her, which carried over during the



entire Women's Day Service. In addition, we were blessed to have Sis Winfield's mother, sister, Godmother, and sister's friend in our midst, as they accompanied her and added to the sister connection.

The Women's Day sermon was taken from Ephesians 2:1, with the title being "The Value of Dirt." Pastor had visuals for us which he purchased from his favorite store, Lowes. He let us know he spent a lot of time in Lowe's and was astonished to discover the cost of dirt. One 40 lb. bag of dirt costs \$1.65 and other smaller sized bags of dirt cost even more based on the variables which were added to the dirt.

Pastor Sterling then indicated for us to get more understanding of the value of dirt and how it relates to us, we



need to go to the scripture, and the best place to find out how this relates to us is in the beginning of the Bible, which is in Genesis. As stated in Genesis 2:7, And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath if life; and man became a living soul. This passage of scripture refers to us, as we were created from dirt.

Pastor indicated people are messed up based on who they think they are, but truth be told, we are all just dirt...that's how we began our journey. Men can put on nice suits and ladies can wear nice dresses and add other variables, but these variables don't add to our value...we are still dirt and bad dirt at that. Dirt is dirt and we need to know who we really are. Pastor gave us a visual by picking up one of his bags of dirt and

asked us to imagine dressing the bag up by putting lipstick on it or some cuff links, and how silly the bag would look, but in addition to all of that, the bag would still end up being a bag of dirt. He reiterated being dirt doesn't give us authority to talk about others, because its just one dirt talking about another dirt!

Every child of God is dirt that God scooped up and made into a living being. When he breathed into us, he gave us value and made us valuable, but sin came along, corrupted us as dirt, and made us worthless and having no value. We think of ourselves as good dirt, but we shouldn't think of ourselves in that manner. Romans 12:3 tells us quite the opposite.

Pastor Sterling gave us some insight about the land the church is occupying to bring the lesson home to us.

The 27 acres of land the church is built on was tested after it was purchased and was found to be not that good, meaning it contained items such as silt and other non-valuable items that were not conducive for placing the church structure upon it. To rectify the problem, the dirt could be dug up, put on trucks, and replaced with good dirt; however, this option would have been very costly for us and was not chosen. The other option was to put nutrients and other miracle nutrient items in the dirt to add value to it, and to do this would have been at a significantly lower cost than the first option. So, this is the option the church went with.

The Pastor then gave us another visual showing a bag of good dirt which had the miracle nutrients in it that made it appear darker and richer looking than the other bag of bad dirt which was gray, dull, and lackluster in appearance. In other words, God did the same thing with us. He put the right stuff in us to make us valuable. He was crucified for the dirt. He died for the dirt. He arose for the dirt. He ascended into Heaven for the dirt and he did all of this for us because we are valuable to Him! It doesn't matter what the cost was, God paid EVERYTHING to make us alive, because we were dead and worthless at one time when we were bad dirt. During



that time when we were dead and worthless, we loved dead things and we hung out in graveyards doing dead things like drinking, hanging out with bad people, and having no sense of direction. Some of us may still be stuck and dead, but God made us alive. Don't forget our past is our past and we shouldn't let our past predict our future.

The message closed with we are valuable to the King and we shouldn't let the sins of our past affect us today. God was rich in mercy and he sent his mercy our way, even amidst our past sins. He brought us out from our sins, he died, and he gave us value. *Romans 5:8*

Going forward, whenever we see dirt, our minds should take us back to today's lesson and we shouldn't look at the dirt as just plain dirt, we should remember "The Value of Dirt!"
